Carol Reese – Keynote Presentation

Title: They Don't Know What They Don't Know: a humorous look at why our clients under value our endeavors



Ric Bessin, Ph.D. – Crew Academy

Title: Pesticide Training and Certification Update: Laws, Certification, Aerial Applications, ESA, Spanish labels, Online Testing

Biography: Dr. Bessin has worked at the UK with responsibilities including insect management on field and specialty crops, pesticide safety, IPM, and pesticides for specialty crops. He has worked to develop and evaluate IPM

decision guidelines and management strategies for fruit, vegetable, and field crop insect pests in conventional and organic production systems, provided education to a wide audience from Master Gardeners to youth groups to the commercial agriculture industry. He serves as the Kentucky Integrated Pest Management Coordinator, the Pesticide Safety education Coordinator for Kentucky, and Kentucky liaison to the IR-4 Project that helps to register pesticides for minor uses and minor acreage crops.



Matthew Dixon – Crew Academy

Title: Ag Weather Update

Synopsis: Agricultural management and production decisions are largely influenced by short-term weather conditions during the growing season. However, it's crucial to consider long-term trends. Over the past decade, the Ohio Valley has experienced a

noticeable shift towards a warmer and wetter climate. This presentation will focus on the agricultural implications of this shift with the hope of sparking thoughts on future crop nursery and landscaping practices. In addition, we'll look back at the 2023 growing season, provide an outlook for the upcoming months, and introduce the audience to an innovative weather app developed by the Ag Weather Center.

Title: Controlling Wildlife in Landscapes and Nurseries

Synopsis: Dr. Springer will cover the basics on controlling small rodents and larger wildlife that frequently cause issues in landscapes and nurseries. Management strategies that involve lethal, non-lethal, and chemical components will be discussed along with legal

Title: What's in a name? Updates to the Kentucky Invasive Plant List

Synopsis: Invasive plants, non-native species that spread out of control and cause problems, are all over. But, one person's invasive nuisance might be another's beloved landscape ornamental. Who decides what is invasive and what's not? This session will

explore the topic of how plants are determined to be invasive and discuss current efforts to update Kentucky's invasive plant list and listing procedure.

Title: Native Perennials That Perform

Synopsis: Native plants are sometimes marketed as being inherently tougher than introduced species, but can be just as underwhelming in our heavily altered landscapes. Through the first 13 years of gardening at the Parklands of Floyd's Fork, we will look at the eastern North American perennials that have shined despite the

familiar challenges of a heavily-used public space.



Sayde Heckman - Plants & Design

Title: Crazy Plant Lady: Let's Talk Tropicals

Synopsis: In the gardens she has combined her love of design and tropical plants, establishing a rotating system of spring, summer, and fall annual displays. Working alongside the horticulture staff she and her team of horticulturists have evaluated hundreds of new selections each year, inspired the community, and continued

introducing new ways of using tropicals in garden designs.

Biography: Sayde Heckman has been the Garden and Arboretum Manager at Yew Dell Botanical Gardens since 2018, starting off as a Horticulture Apprentice in 2017.



Eric Bitner - Arborist

Title: Proper Tree Pruning - "one of the best, worst maintenance practices"

Synopsis: Trees are important assets to our built environment and offer both functional and aesthetic benefits. We often have to plant trees in locations that are less than desirable and therefore they need our help to survive. The goal in any maintenance program should be to maximize the benefits of the tree while

minimizing inputs required for it to survive. Pruning is often necessary but if done improperly can have detrimental effects. This talk will seek to explain various aspects of proper pruning for landscape and tree professionals. Topics discussed will involve types of pruning cuts, how to make proper cuts and expected responses from the tree. The goal will also be to cover what to consider when pruning in order to create a strong form, as well as the timing of making pruning cuts on trees.





Morgan Grubbs - Arborist

1st Presentation Title: The Bigger the Trees the Bigger the Benefits: How to educate the public on "right tree right place" and encourage canopy sized trees in landscapes where possible.

1st **Presentation Synopsis:** During this presentation TreesLouisville will discuss the benefits of educating the public on how to be better tree stewards and understand a tree's importance in remaining resilient against climate change and future

development.

2nd **Presentation Title:** Louisville's Urban Forest Master Plan: How will studying our urban forest needs improve Louisville's tree canopy?

2nd **Presentation Synopsis:** During this presentation TreesLouisville will discuss the importance of a city having an Urban Forest Master Plan including how data will be collected, interpreted, and used for future tree preservation and care.

Biography: Morgan Grubbs has been with TreesLouisville for 3 years and currently holds the Programs and Volunteer Director position where she manages all outreach events, develops & maintains tree planting projects, and completes any and all tasks necessary of a small non-profit. She holds a BS from Indiana University in Environmental Management and plans to receive her ISA Arborist Certification this spring. She has over 10 years experience developing programs in conservation and environmental education, including a 5 year stint overseas in South Africa and Vietnam. When not working with trees you can probably find Morgan still hanging out with trees as she is an avid hiker, runner, and biker.

Jonathan Larson, Ph.D. - Keynote Presentation

Title: Fear and Loathing in Entomology

Title: People don't like bugs. Entomologists only answer one question more often than "what is it?" and it's "how do I kill it?" Jonathan Larson of UK Entomology will share farfetched tales of insect hatred from his career in Extension and show how these attitudes have real world impacts.



Kenneth Clayton – Turf Management

Title: Lawn Renovation: Should I consider Zoysiagrass?

Synopsis: In a changing climate pest management brings unique challenges to those growing grass in the transition zone. We have seen and will likely continue to see a decrease in the availability and use rates of common herbicides, insecticides, and fungicides. One of the most important decisions we must make in managing pest is

what grass species we grow and how. This talk will discuss the pros and cons of converting a lawn to zoysiagrass and the implications it has for pesticide use.



Brad D'Angillo, P.E. - Turf Management

Title: When Does Synthetic Turf Make Sense For Residential, Parks, or Recreation Facilities?

Synopsis: Synthetic turf has been widely accepted in a variety of sports facilities for over 20+ years. Incorporating synthetic turf into residential, parks and recreational facilities is the next frontier for this alternative to natural grass. Attendees will hear from a nationally recognized synthetic turf civil engineer on the basic material, design,

maintenance and cost considerations of synthetic turf. The presentation will also provide insight on innovative applications of synthetic turf in non-sports programming elements.
